Community Band will feature soloists

The Park Rapids Community Band will give the first of three outdoor summer concerts at 4 p.m. Sunday, June 2 on the lawn of Douglas Lodge in Itasca State Park.

Sunday is Open House Day at all Minnesota State Parks so no stickers are required.

The band's two other performances will be at 6:30 p.m. Sunday, June 30 at Heartland Park and 7 p.m. Saturday, Aug. 24 at Bad Medicine Lake.

Jim Wheeler, conductor, said this summer's series will be basically the same concert program repeated at each location.

Two soloists will be featured on Sunday's program. Donna Walsh of Park Rapids will do a vocal solo with the Community Band performing "Someone to Watch Over Me," an Ira and George Gershwin number, revived in the recent movie, Mr. Holland's Opus.

Craig Swartz, Waukee, IA will be trumpet soloist for the selection Trumpeter's Lullaby by Leroy Anderson. Swartz is a trumpeter in the Des Moines Symphony and has a summer home on Cass Lake.

Park Rapids' Bill Sanger will direct The Minnesota March by John Philip Sousa. Sanger has a special connection with this work. Sousa's Minnesota March was first performed in 1927 at the Minnesota State Fair by his own band. Sousa presented a copy of the score and an autographed picture of himself to William F. Sanger, who was president of the State Fair Board. His grandson, William M. Sanger, who will conduct the piece, is a charter member of the Park Rapids Area Community Band.

The program opens with the classic, "Strike Up the Band" by George Gershwin. Following are selections including the Allegro, Air and Hompipe movements from Handel's Water Music Suite; "America" in a march arrangement by John Cacavas; Fantasy on an American Classic (Shenandoah), arranged by James Swearingen; "Salvation of Life" by Ralph Hultgren; an outdoor arrangement of "Moonglow" by Jay Dawson; the "Colonel Bogey March" by Kenneth J. Alford; the hymn, "Morning Has Broken," arranged by Tom Wallace; the "St. Louis

Blues March" by W.C. Handy; and the band's traditional closing number, "The Stars and Stripes Forever" by John Philip Sousa.

The Park Rapids Community Band gave its premiere concert Dec. 7, 1991 as part of a program observing the 50th anniversary of the bombing of Pearl Harbor.



PROGRAM NOTES

John Krance's arrangement of George Gershwin's STRIKE UP THE BAND is considered a classic. Listen as he weaves segments of "March Militare," "'S Wonderful," "American in Paris" and the Triumphal March from "Aids" into this Broadway show tune. The PRACWE has not found a better way to begin a concert.

The WATER MUSIC is undoubtedly the most famous and popular of all Handel's instrumental works, consisting of three separate suites. The following is a quote from a report written by an envoy to the English Court of George I in 1717. "Some weeks ago the king expressed a wish to have a concert on the river (Thames). By the side of the Royal barge were musicians to the number of 50 who played all kinds of instruments: trumpets, hunting horns, oboes, bassoons, German flutes, violins and basses. This concert was composed expressly for the occasion by the famous Handel, native of Halle, the first composer of the King's music. It was so strongly approved by His Majesty that he commanded it to be repeated, once before and once after supper, although it took an hour for each perfor

DIE FLEDERMAUS is an operetta in three ects by Johann Strauss, it was first performed in Vienna on April 5, 1874. Derived from the French cornedy "Le revillon," Die Flodermaus, which means "The Bat," becarse the most popular of all the Vienness operettae. It aply symbolizes the decaying social and moral values in Vienna at the time of Emperor Franz Joseph.

Eisenstein (tenor) is about to serve a jail sentence. The arresting officer finds Eisenstein's wife, Rosalinda (soprano) alone with Alfred (tenor) her former admirer. To save Rosalinda's reputation, Alfred goes to jail in Eisenstein's place and Eisenstein proceeds to a masquerade given at the palace of Prince Orloff. The other guests, all in disguise, include Rosalinda and her maid Adele (soprano). Not recognizing either of them, Eisenstein sets about courting them.

It is a clever and merry story and for it Strauss wrote some of his most ironic, piquant and engaging music. Die Fledermaus was reviewed with outstanding success by the Metropolitan Opera in 1950-1951, presented in an English adaptation by Howard Dietz.

Nadine Christenson, soprano, is a graduate of Chisago City High School and holds a B.A. degree from Bethel College. She has been a featured soloist with the Park Rapide Classic Chorale, Nevis Community Chorus and Park Rapide Area Community Band. Nadine has sung the lead role of the Mother in "Amahl and the NightVisitors." In the spring of 1995, challenged herself by presenting a solo voice recital and she has made numerous solo appearances in various area churches.

Jeff Weaver attended high schools in Lake City and Virginia, graduating from the latter. After earning a B.A. degree from Bemidji State University he has taught Instrumental Music for ten years. This coming school year Jeff was selected to be the high school band director in Blackduck. He has been a member of PRACWE for four years and during that time he has been a featured trumpeter on several concerts including solo spots with the dance band and the dixieland combo.

After last year's program at Bad Medicine Resort which drew an estimated 500 people, owners Don and Carolyn Tschudi decided to make room for a bigger audience this year and enlisted friends and neighbors on the lake to help create the spot. 
'Holiday Pops'

The Park Rapids Area Community Band is in its sixth year of operation. The purpose of this program is twofold: to provide live musical performances to the Park Rapids community and surrounding areas and to enable adult musicians to participate in and share the joy of performing band music as a member of a music performance ensemble that has high musical standards. The PRACB program adheres to an open enrollment policy. Anyone can join. We pride ourselves in the fact that none of the administrators (Board of Directors, Manager, Librarians, Conductors) receive a salary. The members of the PRACB are proud of the support they have given to many past community activities and they look forward to giving their support to future activities. We are very grateful to the community for its positive response to this program.

For the third consecutive year we are turning to the community to ask for help in solving financial needs through an outreach plan approved by the Board of Directors. This plan is called *chair endowment*. In order for our program to make an even greater musical contribution to the community and the surrounding area we are in dire need of the following: an oboe, a baritone saxophone, two tubas, various percussion instruments and music additions to our library.

The chair endowment plan is simply a fund raising vehicle to reach our goal by endowing all 56 chairs in the concert band. Any individual or business establishment can endow a chair in the concert band with a gift of \$100. For those who would like to support this plan beyond that amount, five other options are available. They are: the Polka Band, \$200; the Dixieland Combo, \$200; the 1920's Swing Band, \$400; the 18 member Dance Band, \$600; and the Conductor's podium, \$800. All gifts will be acknowledged in our 1997 concert season programs and all gifts are tax deductible. The PRACB is a non-profit organization.

The Bemidji State University Band will perform with the Park Rapids Area Community Band as part of the 3rd annual Community Band Festival at 7:30 p.m. Saturday, April 26 at the Area High School auditorium.

Directed by Dr Jeffrey Macomber, the Bemidji State University Band will be presenting eight concerts in the United States and Canada during the 1997 tour, including the appearance in Park Rapids

The concert features a varied selection of compositions that highlight the breadth of music available for band today. Included on the program are:

Leonard Bernstein's popular and light-hearted musical setting that long outlasted the play in popularity:

"Australian Up-Country Tune" by Percey Aldridge Grainger, who is considered that country's Stephen Foster,

selections from "A Chorus Line," the great hit tunes by Marvin Hamlisch, and

"Robinson's Grand Entree," the popular circus march by lowan Karl King.

In addition, Jamie Koester will display his award-winning tone, technique and musicianship as the cornet soloist on "La Mandolinata," a Latin-flavored composition by Eric Leidzen. A music major from Bemidji, Koester won the Minnesota division of the Music Teachers National Association Brass Competition and has been selected several times to the Minnesota All-Collegiate Honor Band, earning principal trumpet chair this year.

Macomber is a new member of the BSU music faculty and directs the Jazz Band II as well as the BSU Band. He teaches courses in instrumental conducting, wind and percussion literature and applied music in low brass. He served as guest conductor of the Bemidji Symphony Orchestra last winter.

A native of Cleveland, OH,

Macomber has degrees in instrumental music education, performance and pedagogy from Bowling Green state University and the University of Iowa. Prior to joining the BSU Music Department, he served on the faculties of Clarion University, Armstrong State College, Phillips University and Coe College.

An active instrumentalist, he has performed with several symphonies, orchestras and bands across the country, and has held, for five years, a continuing appointment to the Symphony Orchestra of Brazil in Rio de Janeiro.

Further, McIntyre has assisted the students in dressing properly for contests and recitals. When the Bemidji High School orchestra needed new uniforms, McIntyre took charge and sewed several of them herself

"It is a real privilege and honor to have this opportunity to serve our organization." Ulmer said. "Special education, like general education and many public service areas such as health, human services and the justice system, is under tremendous public pressure to be more accountable and cost effective. Reform will be the focus of our efforts over the next five to ten years. We will need to work closely with all of the many stakeholders involved in the delivery of special education and related services. It will be an exciting and challenging time for our profession.

The Bemidji Regional Interdistrict Council, where Ulmer is currently executive director, is a large special education services cooperative serving 12 member districts in North Central Minnesota. Ulmer's former professional positions include: director of the Park Rapids Area Special Education Cooperative. building principal, and special education teacher.

The 50th Annual Bernidji State other groups University MusiCamp will provide its educationally rewarding program for vocal and instrumental music students in grades 7-12 this summer.

A noted choral conductor, composer and author, he has presented over 100 workshops and festivals throughout the United States, Europe and Israel. Under his guidance, Bemidji State's Madrigal Dinners have become a Minnesota tradition and been featured at New York's Madrigal Festival concert at Carnegie Half.

Pianists will be able to develop their keyboard skills by participating in a piano program directed by Margaret Maxwell, instructor of piano at Bemidji State. Maxwell is a highly respected piano, harpsichord and organ teacher who maintains a large private studio and is active as a soloist, accompanist, clinician and adjudicator. Maxwell cofounded the North Country Keyboard Teacher Association and is an active member in the Minnesota Music Teachers

The week for the piano students, who are recommended to be at the early-intermediate level, will conclude with a recital of solo ensemble music as well as a performance in the Finale Concert.

In addition to their group sessions, the students will participate in sectional rehearsals, enrichment classes and private lessons.

Program Notes

"The Royal Fireworks Music" was composed in 1749 as a commission from King George in celebration of the Peace Treaty which ended the war of the Austrian succession. There was finally peace in Europe for the first time in many years.

King George wanted all brass and no strings. Handel wanted a complete orchestra. The piece was originally proposed for 12 trumpets, 12 horns, 24 oboes, 12 bassoons and 3 pair of kettle drums. As a compromise, between King George and Handel, a 100 piece orchestra did, of course, include string instruments, but Handel reduced the number of trumpets to 9 and french horns to 9.

The "Gentlemen's Magazine" in 1749, published the following, "So great was the number of people attending the rehearsal [more than 12,000] that it shut down the London Bridge for 3 hours."






It was a record run for hundreds of pastel ducks who braved the Fish Hook River Thursday night.



You drive north, then west, then...

The Bad Medicine Lake area in Becker County is an interesting place.

The lake, as well as others in the vicinity, are set in a pristine wilderness near the western boundary of Itasca State Park.



And the area lies within the White Earth Indian Reservation, causing, in some cases, complications in deeds and property own-

ership.

Residents of Bad Medicine - a lake without an outlet - are plagued with high water levels which threaten trees and manmade structures. Some are considering a plan to drain some of the surplus to an adjacent watershed. Whether the project is realized so far remains little more than speculation. Neighbors as far south as Park Rapids worry that changing the level of water will cause problems from Two Inlets to Fish Hook.

(Others observe that the high water on Bad Medicine Lake could serve as a lesson to those who want to see septic systems allowed closer than 150 feet from lakeshore and accessory structures near the shoreline. In Becker County the rules call for a 75-foot setback and although all the systems on Bad Medicine are in compliance, a number of the drainfields are saturated and unworkable. A number of accessory structures built near the lake are under water as well. Most of them were built before 1971 when state rules were written recognizing there should be limits to their size and proximity to the water.)

Set in the "back woods," the Bad Medicine area is not a good place to have a heart attack. It's a long haul, by car or ambulance, to any community with a hospital - Park Rapids, Bagley, Mahnomen, Bemidji.

But, not to worry, the people in the area are a hearty and healthy sort.

They are folks who appreciate little miracles.

Last weekend the Park Rapids Community Band made it's third annual appearance performing music from pontoons at Bad Medicine Resort. While slightly afar from the beaten path, at least 500 (some said 700) people sat on lawn chairs in a newly sculptured amphitheater setting to hear baroque by Handel, waltzes by Strauss and traditional marches by Sousa. The show stopper was an operatic aria performed by Stuart Haynes, known by many as chair of the Hubbard County Planning Commission.

And a couple of weeks ago an audience of artistic so-journers attended an "SRO" performance by professional musicians who come together for a week each year at

nearby Hoot Owl Resort.

There is little or no food at the concerts, but guests leave with musical appetites sated.

The orchestras survive by voluntary contributions. Cary John Franklin, perennial music director of the "Borderline Philharmonic" at Hoot Owl told the audience this year the cost to hear comparable music in New York City is about \$45, and about \$25 per person in Minneapolis. He said the group would be satisfied with \$5 or \$10 here. Not only that, but no neckties or formal gowns are necessary.

In addition to Haynes singing an opera tune so well that even those who hate opera music appreciated it, the Bad Medicine setting provided another little miracle. Resort owner Don Tschudi erected a large white cross across the bay, which right on schedule caught the rays of the setting sun at mid-concert, flashing a brilliant reflection onto the water. You had to be there ...
